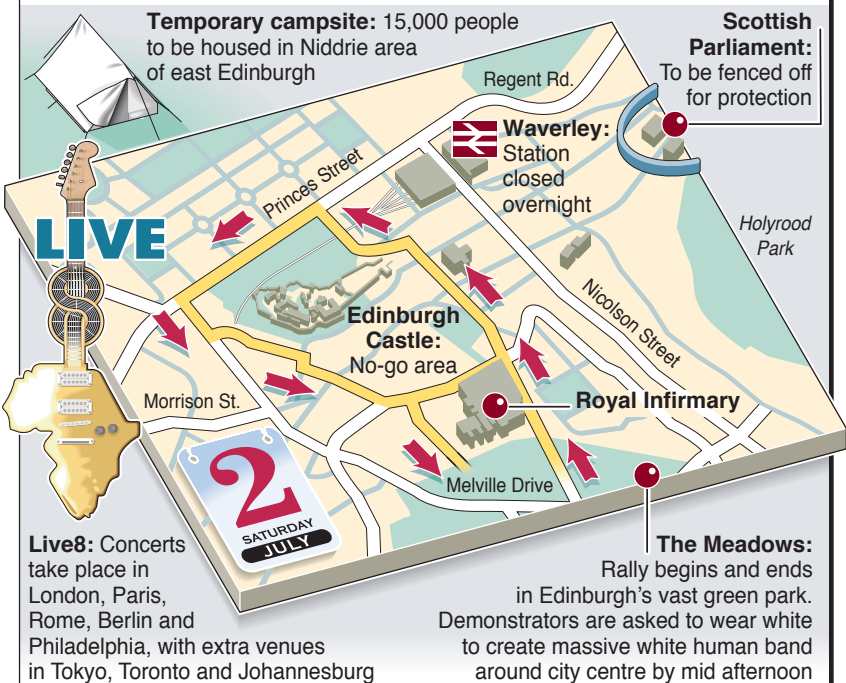


Week of protest marks G8 summit

More than 200,000 people are expected to take part in the *Make Poverty History* march in Edinburgh on July 2, making it Scotland's biggest ever demonstration. The protest is the first of many ahead of the gathering of leaders of the world's richest countries for the G8 summit

The Meadows:

Rally begins and ends in Edinburgh's vast green park. Demonstrators are asked to wear white to create massive white human band around city centre by mid afternoon

Live8: Concerts take place in London, Paris, Rome, Berlin and Philadelphia, with extra venues in Tokyo, Toronto and Johannesburg

3 SUNDAY JULY **Sunday: Alternative Summit** at Edinburgh University features "failed" G8 policies. **Stop the War Coalition** holds "naming the dead" ceremony at Calton Hill

5 TUESDAY JULY **Tuesday:** Mass protest at **Dungavel Detention Centre** in Lanarkshire, As of March, 2005, 1,625 asylum seekers – including children – were being held in detention, some without legal representation

7 THURSDAY JULY **Thursday: Peoples Open Golf Tournament** protest group will attempt to storm one of Gleneagles's five golf courses

4 MONDAY JULY **Monday:** Blockade of **Faslane** nuclear submarine base – west of Glasgow – by CND. So-called anti-capitalist **Wombles** plan anarchist carnival on Princes Street

6 WEDNESDAY JULY **Wednesday:** March to gates of **Gleneagles Hotel** on opening day of summit. Additional **Live8** concert in Edinburgh – Live8 organizer **Bob Geldof** has called for one million people to descend on city

8 FRIDAY JULY **Friday:** Day of action on causes of **global warming** – one of the main issues at the summit. G8 summit ends
