

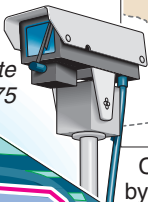
Security ultra-tight at Super Bowl XL

Prior to September 2001, cities hosting American football's biggest game calculated on spending \$500,000 on security. But costs have soared since the "War on Terror" began and some estimates suggest that Detroit – host for the 40th Super Bowl – has had to pay out 10 times that figure

▶ More than 50 federal, state and local agencies involved across Detroit – including cross border co-operation with Canadian authorities

▶ With 100,000 people expected on game day, fans with valid tickets will pass through metal detectors at a single checkpoint

Fenced security perimeter: Includes surveillance cameras and truck scanners

▶ Around 10,000 people involved in security operation

▶ Volunteers must pass security background checks and undergo information and hospitality training
