Asia's Ban set for UN top job

South Korean foreign minister Ban Ki-Moon is front-runner to succeed Kofi Annan and become eighth secretary-general of the United Nations. The UN Security Council has set October 9 as the date when the 192-nation General Assembly must approve the council's choice

- 1944, June 13: Ban Ki-Moon born to farming family in Chungju in central South Korea, towards end of Japanese occupation
- 1962: As a student, Ban first dreams of career as diplomat when he meets **President Kennedy** at White House
- 1970: Graduates from Seoul National University in international relations – joins Republic of Korea foreign ministry
- 1996: Appointed National Security Advisor to South Korean President
- 1999: Serves as Chairman of Preparatory Commission for Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty Organization
- 2001: As Chef-de-Cabinet to President of UN General Assembly, Ban works to engender spirit of cooperation and unity following 9/11 terrorist attacks

- 1975: Becomes staff member at UN
- 1985: Earns master's degree in public administration at Harvard University in Boston. Massachusetts
- Late 80-mid 90s: Occupies diplomatic posts in New Delhi, India; UN in New York; South Korean Embassy in Washington D.C.; and is appointed Ambassador to Austria
- 1992: Serves as Vice Chair of South-North Joint Nuclear Control Commission – key deal for peace and stability on Korean peninsula agreed

- 2004: Appointed South Korean

 Minister of Foreign Affairs and Trade
- 2005: As Foreign Minister, Ban plays key role in Six Party Talks to resolve North Korean nuclear issue
- 2006, Feb: Ban officially declares candidacy for UN's top job the third person to do so
- Ban is married with a son and two daughters. He identifies himself as a Non-Denominational Christian. An English speaker, Ban also speaks French, some German and Japanese
