

Guantanamo shifting to permanent jails

Five years after the first detainees arrived at Guantanamo Bay, the U.S. military is strengthening its detention facilities despite ongoing international criticism. Long-term jails will house hundreds of “enemy combatants”, most of whom are being held without charge

Camps 2 and 3: Highest-level maximum security. Newly-arrived detainees are held here, in 2 x 2.5m cells. Orange uniforms signify “least compliant” category



Camp 1: Maximum security. Detainees who show cooperation are termed “compliant” and moved here, receiving some privileges and wearing tan uniforms



Camp 4: Medium security. Admission for good behaviour. Detainees can eat, pray and exercise together and use communal living rooms. White uniforms show “most compliant” status

Camps 5 and 6: Modelled on U.S. prisons, new maximum security facilities – where prisoners are kept isolated to prevent communication and attacks on guards – will replace older camps

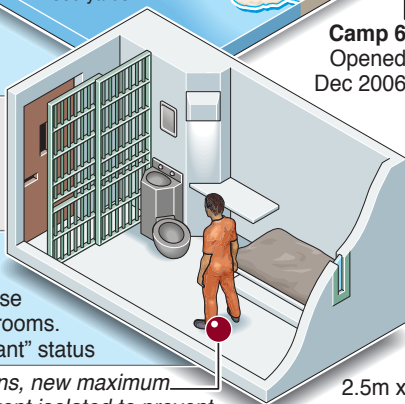
