Military judges have dismissed charges against two alleged al-Qaeda figures held at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, marking a stunning setback to Washington's attempts to try detainees in military courts

- Military Commissions Act:
  Signed by *President George W. Bush*in 2006, says only "unlawful enemy
  combatants" can be tried by military
  commissions
- Status: Legal experts say Khadr and Hamdan lack critical "unlawful" designation and are therefore entitled to prisoner of war status under the Geneva Conventions
- Current detainees: 380

  Down from peak of about 760 held on suspicion of links to al-Qaeda or the *Taliban* in 2002



Salim Ahmed Hamdan: 37-year-old Yemeni accused of chauffeuring Osama bin Laden and being al-Qaeda chief's bodyquard

- Key suspects: 14
  Believed to have contributed to 9/11
  terrorist attacks in United States
- Convictions to date: 1
  Australian detainee *David Hicks*pleaded guilty in March to providing
  material support for terrorism.
  Currently serving nine-month sentence
  in Adelaide prison
  - Suicides: 4
- Force-fed hunger strikers: 32
  Force-fed through tubes in their noses
- Released or transferred to other governments: 395
