- Hamas: Islamic militant group, which calls for destruction of State of Israel, is listed as a terrorist group by West. Hamas gained popularity throughout West Bank and Gaza Strip by establishing extensive welfare programmes, funding schools, orphanages, and healthcare clinics
- Executive Force: Estimated 6,000 fighters, mostly from militant Izz el-Deen al-Qassam Brigades and Popular Resistance Committees.
 U.S. says Hamas is backed by Syria, receives Iranian funds and weapons smuggled in from Egypt, and is linked to al-Qaeda claim denied by Hamas
- Unity government: Saudi Arabianbrokered agreement – to end fighting between rival Hamas and Fatah factions and to govern jointly – threatened as Hamas seeks control of Palestinian Authority

- Palestinian Security Services:
 Fatah-dominated state force of about 30,000 personnel, combines 10 services and several rival groups
- Presidential Guard: 5,000-strong. U.S.-backed, officially controls crossings between Gaza Strip and Israel
- Force 17: Abbas' personal security detail. 3,500-strong force. Recently received \$50 million-plus weapons and training programme from Bush administration, with Israeli approval
- National Security Forces: 450-strong group under Abbas's direct command, trained in Egypt
- Al-Aqsa Martyrs Brigades:
 Military wing of Fatah, responsible for many attacks inside Israel. Part of *Palestinian Islamic Jihad*, umbrella group which includes young militant *Tanzim* group. Strength around 10,000
