
## The plight of minorities in Iraq

The devastating attack against Irag's Yazidi sect has highlighted the crisis faced by Iraq's minority groups. Caught between the warring factions

- Shias, Sunnis and Kurds - communities which once made up as much as 14 percent of the country's population are increasingly under threat



Mainly Sunni who speak Turkish dialect, brought to northern Iraq by Ottomans to repel tribal raids. "Kurdification" policy prompting inter-ethnic violence

CHRISTIANS: 800,000 Includes *Chaldo-Assyrian* and Syriac Christians (Aramaic-speaking descendants of ancient Mesopotamia),

as well as Armenians. Targeted due to perceived association with West and by kidnappers because of their wealth YAZIDIS: 550.000

Kurdish followers of 4.000-yearold monotheistic religion thought to be offshoot of Zoroastrianism. Yazidis worship fallen angel synonymous with Devil in both Islam and Christianity. Islamist groups dub their religion

"impure" and call for their destruction

SHABAKS: 400.000 Originally Aryan, culturally distinct from Kurds and Arabs. Once pushed to "arabise" by Saddam, now under pressure to "kurdify" in ethnically

PALESTINIANS: 35,000 Once given sanctuary by
