WTO MEMBERSHIP

Deal on Russia's entry under threat from FU after Moscow increased tariffs on timber exports,

and from Georgia over Abkhazia. Medvedev says Moscow can gain accession process this year

IRAN

Unlike Western powers. Moscow prefers incentives over sanctions in

tackling Iran's nuclear programme. Policy unlikely to change when Medvedev takes office
