Ahmadinejad faces tough election challenge

The stage looks set for a showdown between reformists and hardliners as incumbent President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad battles for a second term against three prominent candidates in Iran's presidential election



HARDLINERS Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, 52

Represents Iran's ultra-conservatives and is close ally of Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei

Promised Iranians share of country's oil wealth, his popularity has waned since 2005 due to worsening economy



Mohsen Rezaei, 54

Former military commander, now secretary of Iran's *Expediency Council* political arbitration body

Outspokenly critical of Iran's economic policy, he could weaken Ahmadinejad by splitting conservative vote

REFORMISTS

Mir Hossein Mousavi, 67

Served as Iran's prime minister from 1981-89, remembered for efficient handing of economy



Seeks to change Iran's negative image in world but is unwilling to make concessions on nuclear programme

Mehdi Karroubi, 71

Moderate cleric, former speaker of Iran's parliament, now chairman of National Trust Party



Promises social reforms, increased dialogue with West, and to open Iranian economy to private sector
