Pakistan's graft ruling rocks government

A Supreme Court ruling striking down an amnesty given by former president Pervez Musharraf could see corruption cases against Pakistan's President, Asif Ali Zardari, and more than 8,000 other officials reopened



Iftikhar Chaudhry: Outspoken Chief Justice of Supreme Court declared Musharraf's controversial National Reconciliation Ordinance (NRO) as unconstitutional President Zardari: Protected

President Zardari: Protected by presidential immunity. Nicknamed *Mr Ten Per Cent*, Zadari could face charges of allegedly taking kickbacks involving \$1.5 billion during 1990s. Also faces \$60 million money-laundering charge in Switzerland





Rehman Malik: Accused by National Accountability Bureau (NAB) — Pakistan's anti-corruption agency — of alleged involvement in \$150 million oil-for-food scam with Iraqi president Saddam Hussein. Interior Minister is also accused of embezzlement in so-called Yellow Cab Scheme.

Banned from leaving country

Altaf Hussain: Living in exile in London. Faces 72 charges, including 42 of murder or attempted murder



Farooq Sattar: Minister for Overseas Pakistanis faces 23 charges, including five of murder and four of attempted murder. Claims allegations are political

Chaudhry Ahmad Mukhtar: NAB alleges that Defence Minister received kickbacks from export permits. Banned from leaving country

Babar Khan Ghauri: Ports and Shipping minister. **Banned from leaving country**
