British Prime Minister Gordon Brown made light of a bid to force him out of office just months before a general election, but the failed putsch has exposed a behind-the-scenes power struggle with at least six cabinet ministers reportedly wanting Brown to quit

Geoff Hoon, Patricia Hewitt: Main conspirators.
Former ministers under Brown's predecessor,
Tony Blair, texted letters to their colleagues
calling for secret ballot on Brown's leadership

Alistair Darling: Chancellor's plan to reduce Britain's soaring £178bn deficit overruled by prime minister, who wants to boost public spending ahead of election

> Harriet Harman: Deputy Labour leader is frustrated at Brown's dithering over election strategy. Harman is said to be angry over lack of respect shown to her by Brown's staff

Peter Mandelson: First Minister deeply resents PM's reliance on Schools Secretary *Ed Balls*' agenda of high public spending and class war attacks on Tories

David Miliband: Foreign Secretary and leadership contender's relationship with PM has always been tense. Offered lukewarm support for Brown after failed coup

Bob Ainsworth: Defence Secretary – close friend of Hoon and Darling – feels he has little support from PM. Leaks reveal Brown considered three others for top defence job

Douglas Alexander: International Development Secretary, once PM's most cherished protege, feels sidelined. Relationship began to sour after 2007 debacle over *election that never was*
