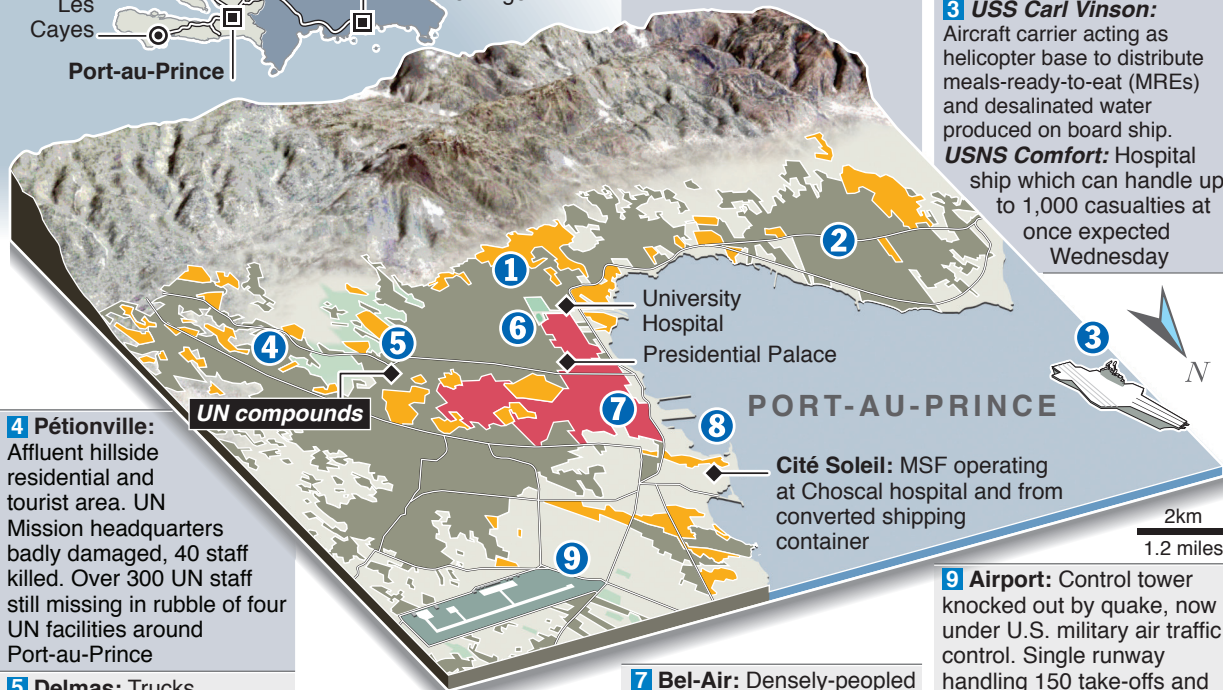

1 Canapé Vert: Shanty town destroyed. Roads so badly damaged that access by search and rescue teams took five days

2 Carrefour: Among hardest hit suburbs, with nearly 90% of buildings destroyed. Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) carrying out more than 90 operations a day. Twin-theatre inflatable hospital en route from Santo Domingo

3 USS Carl Vinson: Aircraft carrier acting as helicopter base to distribute meals-ready-to-eat (MREs) and desalinated water produced on board ship.
USNS Comfort: Hospital ship which can handle up to 1,000 casualties at once expected Wednesday



4 Pétionville: Affluent hillside residential and tourist area. UN Mission headquarters badly damaged, 40 staff killed. Over 300 UN staff still missing in rubble of four UN facilities around Port-au-Prince

5 Delmas: Trucks providing clean water for around 7,500 people in makeshift camps. Latrines for around 1,000 people have also been built

6 Stadium Sylvio Cator: Reports of people fighting with machetes over food packages dropped by helicopter

7 Bel-Air: Densely-peopled slum area devastated. Survivors complain no aid has yet been distributed

8 Seaport: U.S. Army working to open critical port

Cité Soleil: MSF operating at Choscal hospital and from converted shipping container

9 Airport: Control tower knocked out by quake, now under U.S. military air traffic control. Single runway handling 150 take-offs and landings a day – one every 10 minutes

Telephones: Digicel network now operating well, with 70% of cell sites on air
