Concorde trial starts 10 years after crash

- Mar 1969: Maiden flight of Anglo-French Concorde
- Nov 1970: Mach 2 cruising speed - twice speed of sound – attained
- Jan 1976: Concorde enters commercial service
- Apr 1989: British Concorde loses part of rudder over Tasman Sea first major incident in 20 years
- Jul 25, 2000: Both fleets grounded after Air France Concorde crashes on take-off from Paris Charles de Gaulle airport. All 109 people on board are killed along with four on ground

- Nov 2001: Passenger flights resume following restoration of airworthiness certificate
- Oct 2003: Concorde withdrawn from service as falling passenger numbers and crisis in airline industry spell end for supersonic travel
- Dec 2004: Judicial investigation into 2000 crash concludes Concorde caught fire after one of its tyres was punctured by strip of metal on runway that fell from Continental Airlines DC-10
- Feb 2, 2010: U.S. airline
 Continental and two of its
 employees, plus a former French
 civil aviation director and two senior
 Concorde officials, face trial on
 charges of involuntary manslaughter
