prime minister (2002-04, 2006-07)

- Native Russian speaker and former executive in Soviet Union's coalmining industry in eastern Ukraine
- Has strong relations with Moscow, pledging to keep Ukraine out of NATO, but has been careful to say that he is committed to integration with EU
- Blames government corruption and dire economic performance on *Orange Revolution*. Says Ukraine is paying too much for Russian gas − Kremlin should pay "market price" to base its Black Sea Fleet in Sevastopol

■ Has support of country's wealthiest man, billionaire *Rinat Akhmetov* Yulia Tymoshenko, 49. Prime Minister

- Sought to pull Ukraine out of Kremlin's sphere of influence during Orange Revolution, but has now built better relationship with Moscow
- New-found personal rapport with Russian counterpart and former nemesis, *Vladimir Putin*, has eroded her support in fiercely nationalist central and western regions
- Policies include compensation for depositors who lost Soviet-era savings, increase public spending, reduce inflation with price controls
- Has promised banking magnate Sergei Tigipko post of prime minister if she wins presidency
