Outsider closes gap in Costa Rica election

Polls suggest that outsider Otto Guevara is gaining against front-runner Laura Chinchilla ahead of Sunday's presidential election. Guevara has stunned opponents by tripling his poll rating since August, as Costa Rica's 2.8 million voters look for an alternative to the main parties

Otton Solis, Citizen's Action Party: Centreleft former economy minister (55) wants renegotiation of CAFTA, arguing one-sided deal floods country with U.S products, affecting farmers and increasing poverty. Opposes opening up mobile phone market to foreign competition – a condition of CAFTA
