Ed Miliband: MP for Doncaster North (10.909) since 2005, Shadow Secretary of State for Energy and Climate Change, age 40. Came to prominence as Gordon Brown's special adviser after Labour's election

Andv Burnham: MP for Leigh (12.011) since 2001. Shadow Health Secretary. age 40. Standing as centrist working class candidate who best understands ordinary people. Nicknamed "Floa 'em Burnham" over his tough stance
