Vatican probes group tied to scandal

The Vatican has appointed a Spanish archbishop to investigate Regnum Christi – a lay movement affiliated with the Legion of Christ, the powerful conservative religious order disgraced by revelations its founder, Father Marcial Maciel, sexually abused seminarians and fathered three children



- 1990s: Appointed in series of advisory roles to bishops by *Pope John Paul II*, who praises him as "efficacious guide to youth"
- 1997: Accused by nine men of sexual molestation when they were seminarians in Spain and Italy in 1940s. 50s and 60s

■ 1998: Accusations taken to Vatican's Congregation for Doctrine of Faith – headed by Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger

- 2005: Maciel steps down as head of order
 2006: Ratzinger now *Pope*
- **Benedict XVI** removes Maciel from active ministry, inviting him to retire to life of "prayer and penitence"
- 2008: Maciel, 87, dies still a priest
- 2009: Order acknowledges Maciel fathered at least one child with his mistress issues formal apology to victims in March 2010
- May 2010: Vatican issues statement condemning Maciel as "immoral" and saying order must be "purified"
