## **Britain's spending review at a glance**

Chancellor George Osborne has outlined public sector spending cuts and tax rises to slash  $\mathfrak{L}113$  billion off a record budget deficit of  $\mathfrak{L}155$ bn.

The cuts will see up to 490,000 public sector jobs lost by 2014-15



£113bn Target of £83bn of cuts and £29bn of tax rises (total figures rounded)

Whitehall: Waste and admin cost savings will deliver £6bn. Cabinet Office budget cut by

Foreign Office: 24% cut in funding. Overseas aid budget to rise to £11.5bn to meet UN aid commitment

£55m, Treasury budget cut by 33%

Home Office: Budget cut by 6%, police spending to fall by 4% each year. Justice cut from £9.5bn to £7bn

Defence: Budget cut by 8%

Welfare: Further £7bn cuts. Pension age increased to 66 by 2020. Reform of public sector pensions to save £1.8bn by 2015. £2bn investment in new Universal Credit. Winter fuel allowance, free bus passes and TV licences for 75-year-olds protected

**Social housing:** No change in rent for existing tenants. New tenants to pay **80%** of market rent

**Banks:** Permanent tax levy to be introduced. **£900m** for Inland Revenue to crack down on evasion and fraud

Health: NHS spending to rise each year above inflation from £104bn this year to £114bn over next four years

Education: Real increase for schools from £35bn to £39bn by 2014-15.

£2.5bn "pupil premium" for children from poorer backgrounds

Transport: £30bn in investment over four years. Key tube lines upgraded

for Olympics. Rise in cap on rail fares to 3% above inflation from 2012 **Business, innovation, skills:** Annual cut of 7.1%. Science budget protected

at £4.6bn per year. £1bn invested in carbon capture and storage projects

**Culture, media, sport:** Budget down to £1.1bn by 2015. Admin cost must be cut by 41%, but free entry to museums and galleries to remain. BBC licence fee frozen for six years – will fund World Service and Welsh S4C TV from 2015

Civil list: One-year cash freeze. Royal Household spending down 14% in 2012-13. Temporary £1m fund to support costs of Diamond Jubilee
