

First Gitmo civilian trial returns guilty verdict

The first Guantanamo detainee to be tried in a U.S. civilian court has been acquitted on all but one charge over the 1998 U.S. embassy bombings. Ahmed Ghailani still faces prison, but the outcome could undermine the Obama administration's plans to try other terror suspects in civil courts



AHMED GHAILANI

36-year-old Tanzanian is alleged member of Al Qaeda

► **2004:** Arrested in Pakistan and held in secret CIA facility

► **2006:** Transferred to Guantanamo Bay prison in Cuba

► **2009:** Moved to New York to face trial on terror charges

► **Trial:** Convicted on one charge of conspiracy over attacks on U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania, which killed 224 people. Cleared of more than 280 other charges, including murder

► **Sentence:** Faces at least 20 years in prison, and potential life sentence

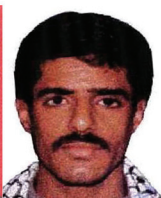
