Mideast unrest could spell end for dynasties

Dynastic succession in the Arab world is coming under pressure as protests sparked by the Tunisian uprising spread through the region



TUNISIA: Many polititians suspect ousted President Zein al-Abidine Ben Ali intended to put forward his wife Leila Trabelsi –

loathed by most Tunisians – as his successor



LIBYA: Muammar Gaddafi appears to be grooming two sons. Saif al-Islam, (left) often tipped as likely heir, but brother Mutassim is using

role as national security adviser to raise his profile



SYRIA: Bashar al-Assad, 45, succeeded father Hafez al-Assad as president in 2000 in smooth transition of power – first

example of dynastic succession. Re-elected unopposed in 2007





EGYPT: President Hosni Mubarak's believed to want his son Gamal – former banker supported by younger elements in ruling National

Democratic party – to succeed him. Protests likely to have derailed plan



YEMEN: President Ali Abdullah Saleh, suspected of grooming his son Ahmed – head of elite presidential quard. Tunisia-

inspired protests demand end of Saleh's rule and succession plan
