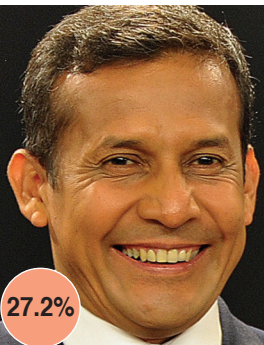


Outcome uncertain in Peru presidential vote

Some 20 million Peruvians are due to vote for a new president on April 10, with five candidates having a realistic chance of making it to a runoff. If no candidate wins more than 50 percent of the vote, a second round will be held on June 5

Ollanta Humala, 48

Former army colonel narrowly lost 2006 runoff to current president **Alan Garcia**. Leftist views appeal to Peru's rural poor but business leaders fear his desire for more state control could derail economy

Keiko Fujimori, 35

Congresswoman is daughter of controversial former president **Alberto Fujimori**, jailed for human rights abuses during his 1990-2000 regime. Would be Peru's first female president

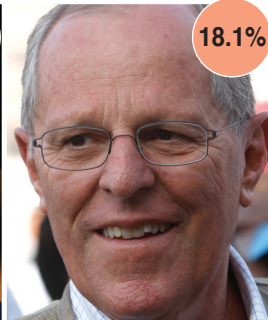

Alejandro Toledo, 65

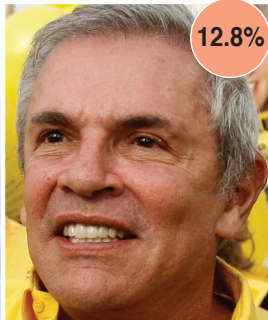
Served as Peru's first president of native Indian origin (2001-2006). Presided over period of strong economic growth, although his tenure was marred by party and personal scandals

Pedro Pablo Kuczynski, 72

Finance minister in Toledo's government, largely credited with Peru's economic boom. Has pledged to give up U.S. citizenship, after criticism from opponents over his dual nationality

Luis Castaneda, 65

Served as mayor of Lima 2003-2010. His popularity has waned after poor performance in TV debates and alleged overspending on public works during his administration
