

# Hackers claim CIA website disruption

A hacker group which has gained notoriety in recent weeks for attacks on Sony, Nintendo and American broadcaster PBS, has now added the U.S. government to its list of internet targets

■ **Jan 11:** Sony sues U.S. hacker **George Hotz** after he "jailbreaks" **PS3** game console, allowing it to run non-Sony software. Hacker alliance **Anonymous** declares war on Sony

■ **Apr 3:** Anonymous bombards Sony's servers with **distributed denial of service (DDoS)** attacks

■ **May:** **Lulz Security** founded as splinter group of Anonymous

■ **May 7:** LulzSec hacks into website of Fox TV's **X Factor**

■ **May 30:** LulzSec hacks into U.S. **Public Broadcasting System (PBS)** website

■ **Jun 2:** LulzSec claims to have accessed data of 100,000 Sony account holders. Sony claims real number was around 37,500

■ **Jun 8:** LulzSec hacks into website of **Black & Berg Cybersecurity Consulting**

■ **Jun 12:** LulzSec mounts DDoS attack against **Bethesda Game Studios**

■ **Jun 15:** LulzSec launches attack on public website of **CIA**, taking website offline

■ **Feb 12:** Hotz publishes his jailbreak tools. His web page attracts 1.8 million visitors

■ **Apr 19:** **PlayStation Network** attack takes service offline. 77 million users locked out for a month

■ **May 3:** Sony admits hackers stole information from 24.6 million accounts, including details of 12,700 credit cards

■ **May 15:** British ATM database hacked

■ **Jun 3:** LulzSec hacks FBI affiliate **InfraGard** and games company **Nintendo**

■ **Jun 7:** Canadian Conservative Party hacked

■ **Jun 13:** LulzSec hacks **U.S. Congress** website

■ **Jun 14, Titanic Take-down Tuesday:** LulzSec mounts DDoS attacks against five websites – **Minecraft**, **Eve Online**, **League of Legends**, **Escapist** and **FinFisher**
