
Canadian forces end Afghan mission

Canada's 2,800 troops are returning home from Afghanistan as the country's nine-year combat mission comes to a close. The U.S. plans to withdraw 33,000 of its soldiers by the end of 2012, while other countries, including France, Belgium and the UK, are also planning drawdowns



- Oct 7, 2001: Following 9/11 attacks against United States, Canadian Prime Minister *Jean Chretien* pledges troops to join U.S. and British mission to topple Taliban and Al Qaeda
- Feb 2002: First Canadian troops arrive in Kandahar
- Jul: More than 1,800 Canadians head to Kabul to join NATO's International Security Assistance Force (ISAF)
- Aug: Forces move to Kandahar
- Jan 2006: Taliban bomb attack on military convoy kills Canadian diplomat, 59-year-old *Glyn Berry*

- Mar: Canada launches Operation
 Peacekeeper nation's biggest
 military operation since Korean War
- Sep: Canadian-led ISAF mission Operation Medusa launched from Ma'sum Ghar. Forward Operating Base becomes epicentre of Canada's war in Afghanistan
- Mar 2008: Canadian government extends combat mission but sets July 2011 as deadline for withdrawal
- Jul 7, 2011: Almost all Canadian troops return home, leaving 950 soldiers and support staff to carry out training mission in Kabul until 2014
