French Socialists' presidential contenders

Current and former Socialist Party leaders Martine Aubry and François Hollande are the front-runners to lead the campaign for the presidency in 2012, but one-time favourite Dominique Strauss-Kahn cannot be ruled out as a last-minute entrant. The U.S.-style primaries will be held in October



- Daughter of former European Commission president *Jacques Delors*, credited with rebuilding party after disastrous 2007 election defeat
- Employment minister from 1997-2000, implemented 35-hour working week and championed better healthcare for poor and unemployed
- Elected mayor of Lille in 2001, narrowly defeated *Ségolène Royal* for Socialist Party leadership in 2007
- Seen as genuine and authentic, but critics say she lacks personal ambition to be president

Ségolène Royal, 57

Government minister from 1992-2002, head of regional government in Poitou-Charentes since 2004. Criticised for lacklustre 2007

presidential campaign, which she lost to Sarkozy by six percentage points

- MP and head of general council in rural Correze in central France
- Party leader from 1997 to 2008, stood down soon after splitting from defeated presidential candidate Royal – mother of his four children
- Politics are broadly centre left, supports French youth, fairer taxes and reducing deficit
- Has never held any government position but claims his "ordinary guy" image and inclusiveness is better antidote to *Nicolas Sarkozy* than more experienced candidates



D. Strauss-Kahn, 62

■ Could make late entry if sexual assault charges in U.S. are dropped. Rating sharply down from pre-arrest position,

but could yet benefit from "anyone but Sarko" feeling among electorate

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
