## Legal steps in Breivik case



- terrorism charges over Friday's twin terror attacks in Norway which killed 76 people. Breivik admits attacks, but does not accept criminal responsibility

- Jul 25: Remanded in custody for eight weeks after court hearing held in private so as not to give Breivik platform for his far-right views
- Doctors will then assess Breivik's mental health to see if he is fit for trial, while police collect evidence to build case. Experts say trial could be at least a year away
- Norway has no death penalty and maximum jail term is 21 years. Sentence can be extended for renewable five years if prisoner deemed likely to repeat offence
- New law will soon raise maximum sentence for terrorism in Norway to 30 years. But Breivik cannot be tried under law which has not yet entered into force
