ministerial posts for his loyalty to Chavez. Wields considerable power in business, military and government circles



Elias Jaua

Vice-president, formerly agriculture minister and secretary to presidency

Helped found PSUV and was among most prominent government faces during Chavez's absence for cancer treatment last year



Rafael Ramirez

Energy minister since 2002 and president of state oil company PDVSA since 2004 Among longest-serving

senior officials and very close to Chavez. Seen by some outsiders as de facto No. 2 in government



Top army general and defence minister

Accused by U.S. of helping Colombia's FARC rebels with drug trafficking. Has said that military will not accept opposition victory in 2012 presidential polls



Nicolas Maduro

Foreign minister, but now fighting provincial governorship election on Chavez's orders Former trade unionist.

married to Venezuela's attorney general. Seen by many as heirin-waiting after Chavez's cancer diagnosis



Adan Chavez

President's older brother, governor of Barinas -

Chavez's home state Many Chavez supporters see him as "safe" choice to succeed but others fear his radical left-wing views could trigger disputes within PSUV
