United States – Steps towards gun control

Between 2006 and 2011, 56,439 people were murdered in the U.S. by firearms, twice as many as were killed by all other means combined

1791: The U.S. Constitution protects the right of the people to keep and bear arms

THE 2ND AMENDMENT

■ 1976: Firearms Control

A well regulated Militia being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear

Arms shall not be infringed

Regulations Act bans residents in U.S. capital. Washington DC. from owning handguns, automatic firearms, or high-capacity semi-automatic weapons 1993: So-called Brady Law signed

by President Bill Clinton requires federal background checks into firearm purchaser's criminal and mental health history.

Of 16,454,951 background checks in 2010, just 78,211 firearms purchases (0.48%) were denied

1994-2004: Federal law bans production and sale of assault weapons. President George W. Bush allows ban to lapse

■ 2008: Supreme Court rules that individual Americans have right to own guns for personal use, overturning 1976 gun control law
