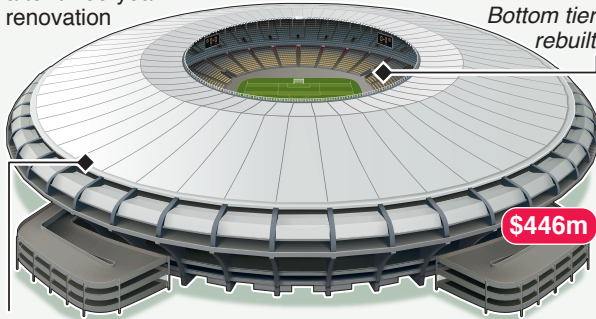
The Confederations Cup in Brazil will showcase six new stadia ahead of the World Cup in 2014

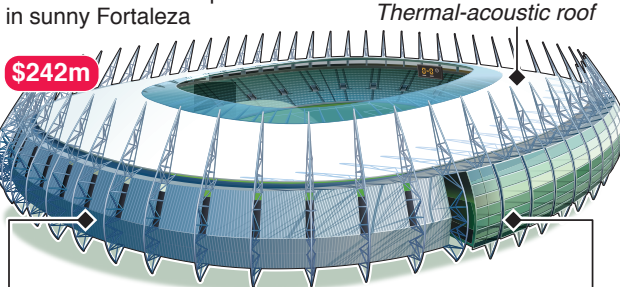
New roof with rainwater collection system

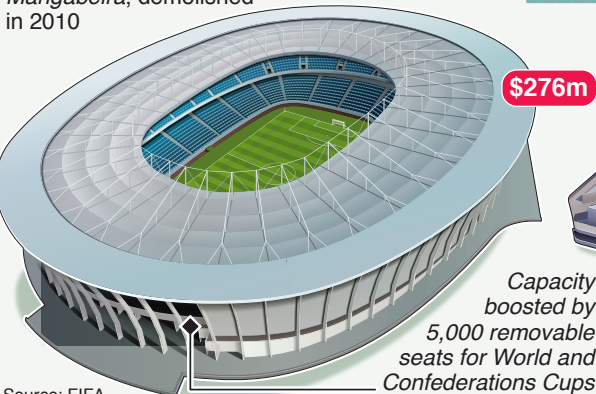

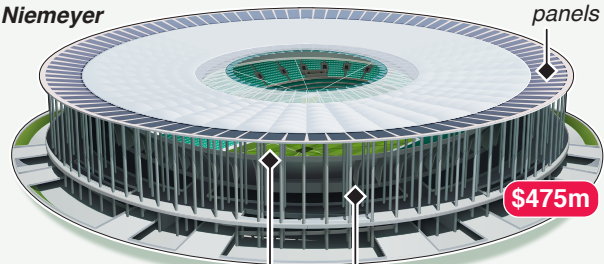
Estadio Nacional – Brasilia

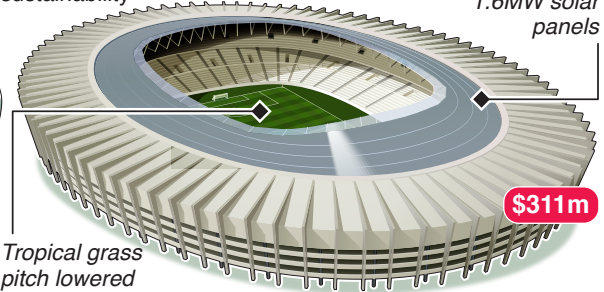
Estadio Mineirao – Belo Horizonte

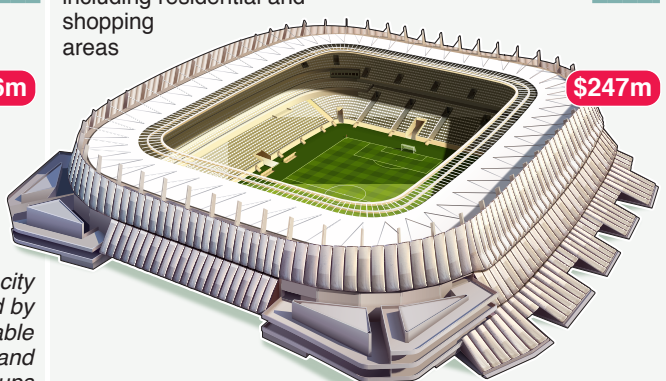
