Suspected Nazi war criminals in U.S. limbo

At least 10 suspected Nazi criminals ordered deported by the U.S. never left the country - and four are still living there today because no other nation was willing to take them

> John Kalvmon. 92: Remains in Trov. Michigan, despite exhausting appeals earlier this year in process that took nine years. Prosecutors say Kalymon, born in Poland, was member of Nazi-sponsored Ukrainian Auxiliary Police in Lviv, which rounded up Jews. Prosecutors say he also shot Jews. His attorney says his client was a "teenage boy quarding a sack of coal"

Vladas Zajanckauskas, 97: Still lives in Sutton, Massachusetts, 11 years after denaturalisation process. Ordered deported

> to native Lithuania in 2007 ran out of appeals in 2010. Authorities say he took part in destruction of Warsaw Ghetto uprising.

He denies being in Warsaw at the time

Theodor Szehinskyj, 89:

Lives in West Chester.

Pennsylvania, 14 years after case against him began. Ordered deported to native Ukraine, Poland or Germany, and exhausted all appeals in 2006. Authorities say he was armed guard at Nazi concentration camps in Germany and Poland. He has denied claims

Jakiw Palij, 89: Remains in New York City seven years after appeals exhausted. Court records say Palij - born in part of Poland

that is now Ukraine was armed guard at SS labour camp in Nazi-occupied Poland until at least spring 1943. He denies accusations

Six other suspects were ordered deported but remained in U.S. until they died because no country was willing to take them
