M23 rebels end insurgency in eastern Congo

The Democratic Republic of Congo's M23 rebel group declared an end to its 20-month rebellion hours after the government claimed military victory



- April 2012: M23 rebels mostly from Tutsi ethnic group with ties to Rwanda's leaders - desert from Congolese army after complaining that terms of 2009 peace deal ending previous rebellion have not been met
- Oct: UN investigators accuse Rwanda of supporting M23
- Nov: M23 briefly seizes control of regional capital, Goma
- Mar 18, 2013: General Bosco Ntaganda - "The Terminator" - gives himself up after losing power struggle within M23. He faces war crimes charges at ICC in The Hague
- Mar 28: UN approves new mission of 3,000 well-equipped African soldiers with tougher mandate to fight rebels in eastern Congo

- Oct 4: U.S. withdraws military aid to Rwanda, accusing it of backing M23 rebels, believed to recruit minors
- Oct 25: Congolese army launches offensive after peace talks break down over rebel demands for amnesty
 - Nov 5: M23 political leader Bertrand Risimwa declares ceasefire military leader Sultani Makenga flees into Rwanda or Uganda
