
Self-governing region of Ukraine, currently under Russian occupation

Full name: Autonomous Republic of Crimea

Area: **26,100 sq km** (slightly smaller than Belgium)

Population: 2.01 million

Ethnic breakdown (2001 census)



Crimean Tatars: Native Muslim group deported en masse during World War II by Soviet leader Joseph Stalin for alleged collaboration with Nazis. Allowed to return in 1990s

Background: Crimea annexed by Russia in 1783. Peninsula becomes part of Soviet Union from 1921 until 1954, when *Nikita Khrushchev* transfers control to Soviet Republic of Ukraine. Region votes to join independent Ukraine in 1992



Russian naval base at Sevastopol gives access to Mediterranean Sea. Facility leased from Ukraine until 2042 in exchange for discounts on Russian gas supplies
