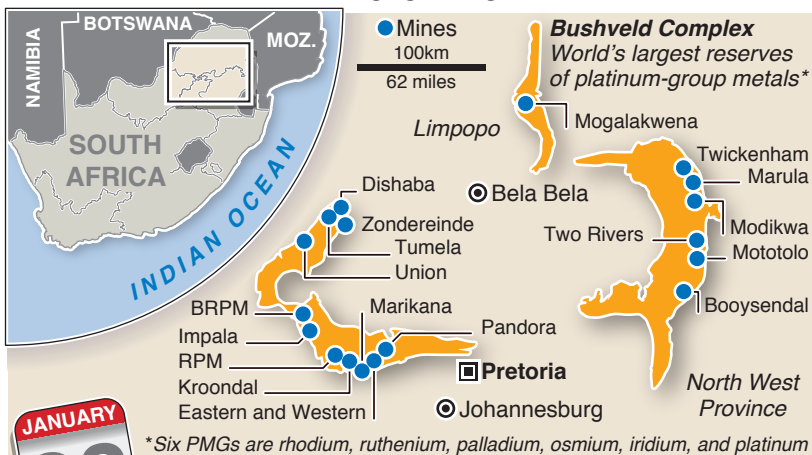


South Africa's platinum strike

The world's top three platinum producers are taking their latest wage offer directly to employees in a bid to end South Africa's longest and most damaging mining strike



*Six PMGs are rhodium, ruthenium, palladium, osmium, iridium, and platinum

■ 70 000 members of **Association of Mineworkers and Construction Union (AMCU)** strike, demanding immediate doubling of monthly basic wage to **12,500 rand (\$1,200)**

■ **Mar 4:** AMCU refuses to move on wage demand but says it will accept annual increases over three or even four years

■ **Apr 17:** Mining companies **Amplats**, **Impala** and **Lonmin** offer to raise pay, including bonuses and living allowances, to 12,500 rand/month by July 2017.
AMCU sticks to its minimum entry-level basic wage demand

■ **Apr 28:** Producers start campaign using text messages and mass meetings
