## **Indonesia candidates battle for presidency**

The world's most populous Muslim nation votes for its next president on July 9, with the race tightly contested between Jakarta governor Joko Widodo and former army general Prabowo Subianto

- Campaign: Known as "Jokowi," Widodo has won praise for his leadership of Jakarta, attempting to tackle traffic congestion and flooding, starting construction of long-awaited subway line and launching health insurance programme for residents
- Appeal: Former furniture salesman known for his down-to-earth demeanour has risen from relative obscurity to forefront of national politics. Popularity driven by clean track record and moves aimed at shoring up support among poor
- Policies: Promising to build clean government by fighting corruption, and prioritise funding for education and healthcare. Pledges to gradually eliminate costly fuel subsidies over four-year period, saving government \$30 billion

- Campaign: Marred by accusations of human rights abuses while head of Indonesia's feared special forces unit, in particular during violence that toppled his former father-in-law and long-time Indonesian dictator *Suharto* in 1998
- Appeal: Has projected tough-man image in effort to connect with voters who think Indonesia needs strong leadership. Stresses importance of nationalism and protectionist approach to economy, potentially worrying to foreign investors
- Policies: Focus on conserving natural resources to make Indonesia more self-sufficient, and changing economic structure to benefit poor and farmers. Proposes to hold fuel prices steady, but only for lower income citizens
