Euro 2020 (20 places)

- No automatic qualification for any host country – 54 member associations divided into six groups of five, and four groups of six
- Group winners and runners-up qualify directly to Euro 2020

Matchdays: March, June, September, October, November 2019

NEW FORMAT

- 54 member associations divided into four divisions based on rankings
- Divisions further split into four pools, teams play in round-robin format
- Pool winners in each division will play-off for one place in Euro 2020 – if winner has already qualified, next best ranked team in division will claim play-off berth
