Bali Nine leaders: Countdown to execution

Andrew Chan and Myuran Sukumaran, ringleaders of the so-called Bali Nine, a group of nine Australians convicted in 2006 of heroin smuggling in Indonesia, could face execution within hours

Sukumaran

- Apr 8-12, 2005: Australian police tip-off Indonesian counterparts about smuggling attempt, advising them to "take whatever action you deem necessary"
- Apr 17: Chan arrested at *Ngurah Rai Airport* with four other members of group, who have 8.3kg of heroin strapped to their bodies. Sukumaran and other three arrested in *Kuta*, preparing second shipment
- Apr 27: Indonesian police shoot dead Nepalese citizen *Mann Singh Gali*, who they claim supplied heroin
- Oct: Trial of Bali Nine begins
- Feb 2006: Chan and Sukumaran sentenced to death by firing squad. Other seven sentenced to life in jail
- Jun-Jul 2011: Chan and Sukumaran's requests for judicial reviews, filed in 2010, rejected
- May-Jul 2012: Chan and Sukumaran appeal to President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono for clemency

- Dec 2014: New president, *Joko Widodo*, stresses he will not grant clemency to drug traffickers
- Jan 2015: Chan and Sukumaran's bids for clemency rejected
- Feb 4: Request for second judicial review rejected. Australian foreign affairs minister *Julie Bishop* makes plea in federal parliament for Indonesia to spare lives of both men
- Mar 4: Chan and Sukumaran transferred from Bali jail to *Nusa Kambangan Island* to await execution
- Mar 5: Australian Prime Minister Tony Abbott asks Indonesia to "pull back". Widodo rules out prisoner swap
- Apr 21: Widodo restates commitment to execute men
- Apr 25: Chan and Sukumaran given 72 hours' notice of their execution, along with seven other convicted drug traffickers six foreigners and one Indonesian
