CHINA-MYANMAR TIES: KEY ISSUES

Myanmar elections: Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy expected to do well, though she herself is barred from standing for presidency

Trip to China seen as attempt by Beijing to build relationship with potential future kingmaker





Power shift: Since taking power in March 2011, Myanmar's reformist government has sought to decrease heavy dependence on China and build ties with U.S.

Public protests led government to suspend construction of controversial Chinese-funded Myitsone hydroelectric dam (1)

Social unrest: Villagers have faced violent security crackdowns during years of rallies against Chinese-operated Letpadaung copper mine (2)

Suu Kyi expected to discuss both copper mine and Myitsone dam with Chinese leaders

Border tensions: Stray army shells from fighting between Myanmar government and ethnic Chinese rebels killed at least five people in China's Yunnan province in March (3)

China has held live fire drills near border in response

■ Human rights: Suu Kyi has attracted recent international criticism over her silence on treatment of minority Muslim Rohingya in Myanmar, who suffer persecution in Rakhine state (4)
