- May 8, 2012: U.S. officials foil AQAP plot in Yemen to detonate upgraded version of failed 2009 "underwear bomb"



■ Oct 31, 2015: Russian A321 airliner crashes in Egypt's Sinai Peninsula, killing all 224 people on board. U.S. and UK intelligence suggest bomb could have brought down plane
