Molenbeek, a poor and diverse neighbourhood of Brussels with a reputation as a haven for jihadists, has been linked with a string of Islamist attacks across Europe and elsewhere since at least 2001

in Syria, lived in Molenbeek
at time of attack



■ Jan 8-9, 2015: French-born Amedy Coulibaly kills policewoman and four hostages at kosher supermarket in Paris in wake of

attack on Charlie Hebdo magazine.
Coulibaly acquired weapons from local arms trader in Molenbeek

Jan 14: Alleged plot to attack
Belgian police foiled by raids – two
men killed in Verviers. Men had
connections to Molenbeek



Aug 23: Ayoub El Kahzzani, of Moroccan origin, opens fire in Parisbound train from Amsterdam before being overpowered by passengers. El Kahzzani stayed in Molenbeek with sister before boarding train in Brussels

Nov 13: Multiple attacks in Paris kill 129 people and injure over 300. Abdelhamid Abaaoud (below left) – suspected mastermind currently fighting alongside Islamic State in Syria – and Salah Abdeslam (right), key suspect on run, both lived in Molenbeek
