

France's labour unrest

France faces strike chaos, with unions demanding the scrapping of controversial labour reforms, just days before 2.5 million ticket-holders arrive for the Euro 2016 football championship



National rail services

Rolling train strike called by hardline **CGT** union is expected to affect about half of national and regional train services

RATP

Paris

Jun 2: Paris transit authority, **RATP**, starts indefinite strike. Metro, bus and RER rail network carries 8.2 million passengers a day

Jun 10: **SUD** union has called on RATP workers to join another indefinite strike from first day of Euro 2016 tournament

Jun 14: Strike at Orly Airport expected to disrupt 15% of flights

Fuel depots

Strikes and blockades have left six of France's eight oil refineries shut or running at reduced capacity



Philippe Martinez: Secretary-general of **Confédération générale du travail (CGT)** is demanding President Hollande withdraw law designed to make it easier to hire and fire employees.
Six out 10 French people support strikes

Jun 3-5: Unions representing air traffic controllers have called on up to 12,000 workers to strike.

Jun 14: Potentially worst day for strikes with nationwide action to coincide with labour bill going to Senate
