▲ The Indian film industry was born when the silent full-length feature film Raja Harishchandra was first shown in Mumbai, drawing vast crowds

May 4, 1926

▲ The first ever General Strike in Britain began. Over nine days, troops helped maintain essential services, here escorting a food convoy in central London

May 5, 1821

▲ Napoleon Bonaparte, deposed Emperor of France who conquered much of Europe before his defeat at Waterloo, died a British prisoner on the island of St Helena

**1961:** Astronaut Alan Shepard became the first American in space in a 15-minute sub-orbital flight

1992: An Andy Warhol 1962 silkscreen of stacked Coke bottles sold at auction for \$2.1 million

**2010:** Over 100,000 Greeks took part in a general strike to protest against stringent planned austerity measures

2011: Claude Choules, the world's last First World War combat veteran, died in Perth, Australia, aged 110

▲ The Channel Tunnel, which linked Britain and France for the first time since the Ice Age, was opened by Queen Elizabeth II and President Francois Mitterrand
