

Fallout over Kim Jong-Nam murder



Kim Jong-Nam dies after attack at Malaysia's Kuala Lumpur airport. Kim is travelling with

passport in name of **Kim Chol**

Seven more suspects sought, all North Koreans, including embassy official **Hyon Kwang Song**



North Korea's ambassador to Malaysia, **Kang Chol**, says Pyongyang cannot trust

results of Malaysian autopsy and accuses country of being **"in collusion with South Korea"**

VX nerve agent is identified as chemical substance used to kill Kim



Aisyah and Huong formally charged with Kim's murder.

They face mandatory death sentence if convicted

Ri Jong Chol released and deported to North Korea.

Police have insufficient evidence to charge him

Malaysia drops visa-free status for North Koreans.

There are around 1,000 North Koreans working in Malaysia

Pyongyang prohibits Malaysian citizens – including three diplomats, six family members, and two others – from leaving North Korea.

Malaysian Prime Minister Najib denounces "abhorrent act, effectively holding our citizens hostage" and responds with similar ban
