

The gaffes of Sean Spicer

From the day he entered the White House, President Trump's Press Secretary Sean Spicer has been a source of mockery on social media

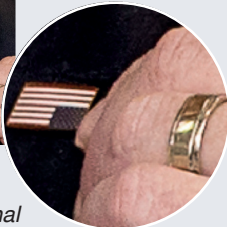
■ **Jan. 21:** Trump becomes president. Spicer declares it ***"was the largest audience to ever witness an inauguration – period."***

Spicer backs up his statement with a series of ***"facts"***, later dubbed ***"alternative facts"*** by White House aide ***Kellyanne Conway***. He later admits it was a mistake



■ **Feb 14:** Press secretary refers to Canada's Prime Minister ***Justin Trudeau*** as ***Joe Trudeau***

■ **Mar 10:** Spicer presides over daily press briefing wearing his American flag pin upside down



■ **Jan 26:** Spicer accidentally tweets what appears to be his password ***n9y25ah7*** – or is it America's nuclear launch codes?

■ **Jan 29-30:** Defending Trump's controversial policy to ban immigrants from seven Muslim-majority countries, Spicer alludes three times to terror attack in Atlanta perpetrated by foreigner. ***Atlanta attack, 21 years ago, was carried out by U.S. citizen***

■ **Jan 31:** Questioned over Trump's tweet about his Muslim ***"ban"***, Spicer says Executive Order ***"can't be a ban"***, instead referring to it as ***"extreme vetting"***

Flying a flag upside-down is conventional protocol to indicate an SOS emergency or distress

■ **Mar 27:** Spicer gives his daily briefing with what appears to be spinach stuck between his teeth, sparking ***Lettucegate*** on social media

■ **Apr 11:** Spicer sparks anger after his insensitive reference to horror of Holocaust during World War II, saying Nazi dictator Adolf Hitler ***"didn't even sink to using chemical weapons"***
