



Trump's revised travel ban

The White House has set new criteria for visa applicants from six Muslim-majority countries and nearly all refugees. The move comes after the U.S. Supreme Court partially restored President Donald Trump's travel ban

■ **New visa applicants:** Must prove "close" family relationship with person already in U.S. – parent, spouse, child, adult son or daughter, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, or sibling – to be eligible. Visas already approved will not be revoked

TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS ON SIX MUSLIM-MAJORITY COUNTRIES



■ Business ties

Travellers from six affected countries may enter U.S. if they have "formal, documented" relationship. Journalists, students, workers or lecturers with valid invitations or contracts are exempt from ban

■ Refugees:

Ban applies to people from all countries who are awaiting approval to enter U.S. – but only if they have not already been issued with valid visa or cannot prove close relationship with person or entity in U.S.

■ Exemptions

People with previous contracts or significant business obligations in U.S., infants, adopted children, those needing urgent medical care, or business travellers with recognised international organisation
