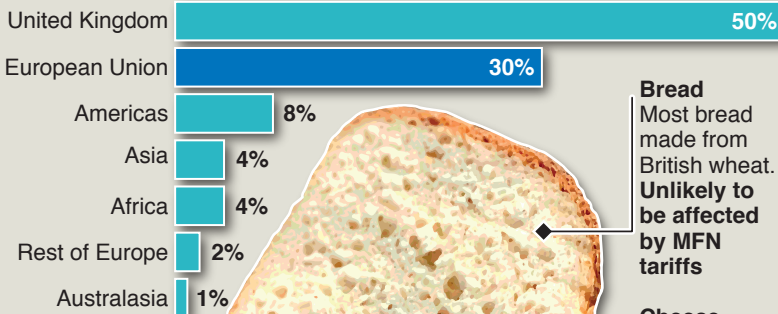


How Brexit could bite the sandwich

If Britain leaves the EU without a deal, trade with the bloc will be bound by World Trade Organization terms, under which imports and exports will be subject to “Most Favoured Nation (MFN)” tariffs

Where Britain's food comes from (percent, rounded)



Ham: Imports from Denmark, Germany, Netherlands and Belgium of 10,700 tonnes every month. Cost of €3,600/tonne. **MFN tariff would add €206/tonne**

Tomatoes: Spain Netherlands – 34,165 tonnes per month at €1,150/tonne. **MFN tariff of up to €240/tonne**

Butter: Imports from Ireland, New Zealand of 7,580 tonnes each month, at €3,862/tonne. **MFN tariff of €622/tonne**

Bread

Most bread made from British wheat. **Unlikely to be affected by MFN tariffs**

Cheese

6,500 tonnes per month of Irish cheddar, at cost of €3,255/tonne. **MFN tariffs would add €1,671/tonne**

Lettuce: Spain. 16,040 tonnes/month at cost of €850 per tonne. **Tariff of €88/tonne**
