

UK Parliament to be suspended

The decision by British Prime Minister Boris Johnson to suspend Parliament, reducing the time lawmakers could try to block a no-deal Brexit, has prompted a furious backlash from opponents

■ **Sep 3:** House of Commons resumes after summer break. MPs could begin attempts to block no-deal Brexit

■ **Sep 4:** Finance minister **Sajid Javid** delivers Commons statement on government spending in 2020-21

■ **Sep 9-12:** Parliament due to be prorogued until Oct 14 – longest suspension since 1945



■ **Sep 14-Oct 2:** Party conferences take place – Liberal Democrat (Sep 14-17); Labour (Sep 21-25); Conservative (Sep 29-Oct 2)

■ **Oct 14:** State Opening of Parliament – Queen's Speech outlines government's legislative agenda

■ **Oct 17-18:** EU summit in Brussels offers final opportunity to avoid no-deal Brexit

■ **Oct 21-22:** Parliament to hold series of votes on Queen's Speech. MPs could also be asked to approve any new Brexit deal agreed with EU

■ **Oct 31:** UK due to leave EU
