

Israel's Netanyahu in the dock

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu goes on trial in Jerusalem marking a historic low for Israel – a sitting prime minister facing charges of bribery, fraud and breach of trust. He denies all wrongdoing



■ CASE 1000

Charges:
Fraud and breach of trust

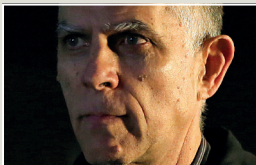


Case alleges that Netanyahu and wife Sara wrongfully received gifts worth almost 700,000 shekels (€182,000) from **Arnon Milchan** (inset above), Hollywood producer and Israeli citizen, and Australian billionaire businessman **James Packer** (top right)

In return Netanyahu helped Milchan with his business interests. **Milchan and Packer deny any wrongdoing**

■ CASE 2000

Charges:
Fraud and breach of trust



Case involves alleged illicit quid pro quo deal between Netanyahu and **Arnon Mozes** (above) – controller of **Yedioth Ahronoth** newspaper – that would have seen prime minister weaken rival newspaper **Yisrael Hayom**. **Mozes denies any wrongdoing**

■ CASE 4000

Charges:
Bribery, fraud and breach of trust



Case alleges Netanyahu granted regulatory favours to telecom company **Bezeq**, and long-time controlling shareholder and former chairman **Saul Elovitch** (inset above)

In return Netanyahu allegedly sought positive coverage of himself and his wife on Elovitch-owned news and media website **Walla**

Elovitch and his wife, deny any wrongdoing
