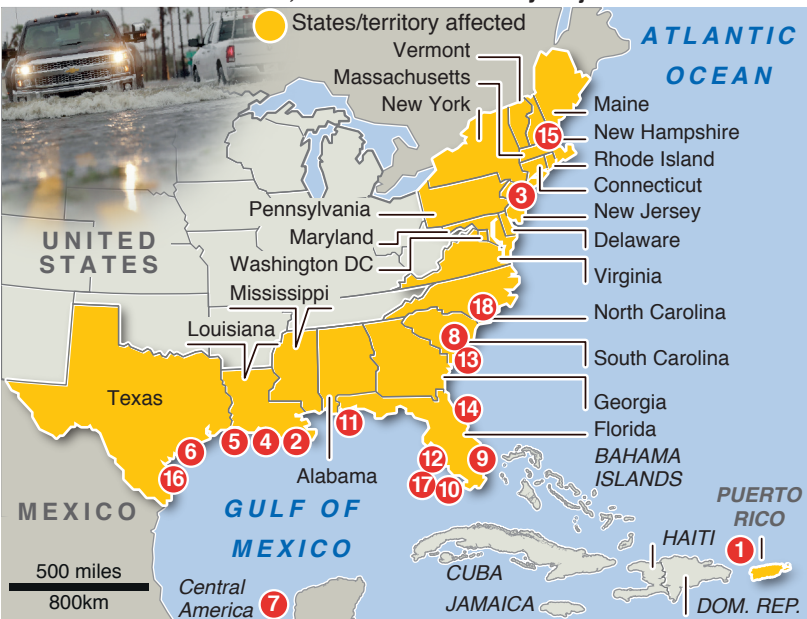


Deadliest U.S. hurricanes and storms

The U.S. faces an above-normal 2021 Atlantic hurricane season with NOAA* predicting 13 to 20 named storms. Six to 10 are expected to become hurricanes, and three to five likely major hurricanes
