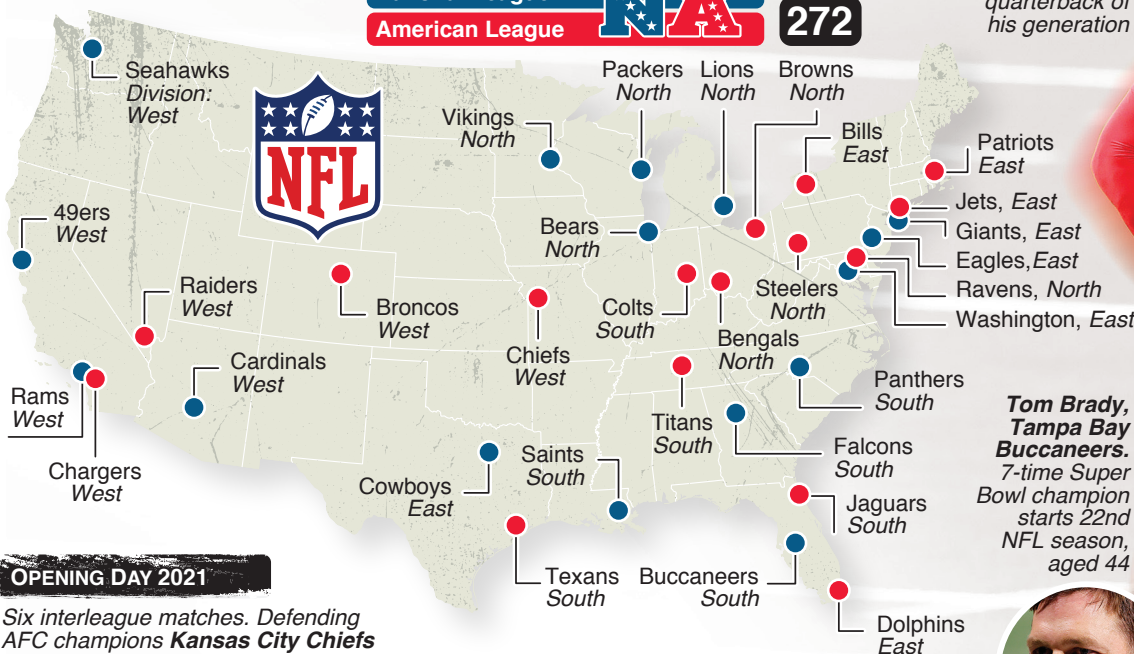

SUPER BOWL CHAMPIONS

National League teams edge series with 28 wins to American League's 27. **New England Patriots** and **Pittsburgh Steelers** hold joint record with six titles apiece

1966: Green Bay beat Kansas City in first Super Bowl

1984-96: National League domination, inspired by MVP's† **Joe Montana** and **Jerry Rice**

2008: Pittsburgh are first team to claim six titles

1972: Miami win first title – only team in NFL history to finish season undefeated

2001: Tom Brady wins first title as **New England** edge St Louis Rams

2015: Denver beat Carolina in Super Bowl 50
