

Allied military support to Ukraine

Western countries have stepped up arms deliveries to Ukraine amid fears that Russia is preparing to invade its ex-Soviet neighbour

United States: More than \$2.5 billion in military aid provided since 2014, including **Javelin** anti-tank missiles, coastal patrol boats, **Humvees**, sniper rifles, surveillance drones, radar systems, night vision and radio equipment

Jan 19, 2022: U.S. approves extra \$200 million military aid package for Ukraine, including more Javelin missiles and launchers, **SMAW-D** grenade launchers, 170,000 rounds of .50-calibre ammunition, and bomb disposal suits



Britain: Reported 2,000 anti-tank missiles – identified as **NLAW** system (below). **Saxon** armoured vehicles also sent



Turkey: **Bayraktar TB2** armed drones (below)



Czech Republic: Plans to donate shipment of 152mm artillery ammunition



Denmark: Allocating support package worth \$25 million, aimed at bringing Ukraine's military up to NATO standards



Canada: Has maintained 200-strong training mission in western Ukraine since 2015



Germany: Ruling out arms deliveries but says it will set up field hospital in Ukraine and provide necessary training



Baltic states: Estonia cleared by U.S. to supply Javelin anti-tank missiles. Latvia and Lithuania sending **Stinger** shoulder-launched surface-to-air missiles
