

Sudan emergency evacuation

■ **U.S.:** Government personnel and dependents evacuated via U.S. Camp Lemonnier in Djibouti. Around 19,000 U.S. nationals remain in Sudan

■ **UK:** Evacuation of 4,000 British passport holders launched from Wadi Seidna airfield north of capital

■ **France:** 538 people evacuated

■ **Egypt:** 436 nationals evacuated

■ **Pakistan:** 427 citizens reach Port Sudan for onward repatriation

■ **Germany:** 400 people evacuated – about 200 citizens remain

■ **Jordan:** 343 nationals evacuated

■ **Russia:** 300 citizens remain in Sudan

■ **Italy:** At least 200 people, including 140 Italians, extracted

■ **Saudi Arabia:** 101 Saudis and 255 others evacuated from Port Sudan

■ **Libya:** 83 diplomats, families and others reach Port Sudan

■ **Spain:** 72 people, including 34 Spaniards, fly to Madrid

■ **Netherlands:** 60 citizens evacuated on Dutch military plane

■ **Japan:** Military aircraft evacuates 45 nationals

■ **South Korea:** Military aircraft evacuates 25 citizens

■ **Austria:** 25 citizens evacuated, about 30 remain in Sudan

■ **Hungary:** 18 citizens evacuated, six others en route to safety

■ **Denmark:** 15 nationals evacuated. Six others remain in Sudan

■ **Belgium:** Eight citizens evacuated, 30 nationals remain

■ **Switzerland:** Embassy staff and families evacuated

■ **Sweden:** Embassy staff, families and others evacuated to Djibouti

■ **Qatar:** Reported RSF attack on embassy convoy heading to Port Sudan

■ **India:** Sending naval ship to Port Sudan, two military aircraft to Jeddah

■ **Norway, Ireland:** Involved in efforts to evacuate citizens
